A WORD FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As I write this newsletter, I am amazed and reminded how committed we are to our students; each other; and to the University. This has been a very busy and progressive spring semester for academic advising at UTSA. We have a UTSA Academic Advising Strategic Plan 2016-2020 that aligns with SACS Assessment requirements and the University Strategic Plan; we have developed a standard Annual Academic Advising Caseload Review policy and process; and also have trained and worked in the new SSC Foundation for these last few months. We look forward to the upcoming training into our next phase SSC Campus.

Our four key points of the UTSA Academic Advising Strategic plan include: 1.) Standardization and Consistency in Advising; 2.) Student Connection to Advising; 3.) Increased usage of technology in Advising and 4.) Professional Development. These key points will continue to be the yearly points of assessment and review. This Plan will continue to guide us as we work towards our mission and goals.

In collaboration with the advising center directors a plan was developed to ensure continuing and incoming 2016-17 students know the importance of having and maintaining an active locked DegreeWorks plan. I appreciate everyone working diligently to develop DegreeWorks locked semester-by-semester plans for their continuing students. There were over 300 locked semester-by-semester plans within the first week of the review policy being implemented. Your steadfast and hard work have identified students that were off track for graduation and you reached out to them to get them back on track. This speaks volumes to your commitment to your students.

Everyone received training in SSC Foundation in February and the majority have been using it daily to prepare for appointments and create lists to enable more proactive advising and management of caseloads. As a result, there have been several exciting results which include more students applying for graduation; increased summer 2016 enrollment; and outreaching to students. I have no doubt that the relationship and proactive advising that you have been doing is helping contribute to student success.

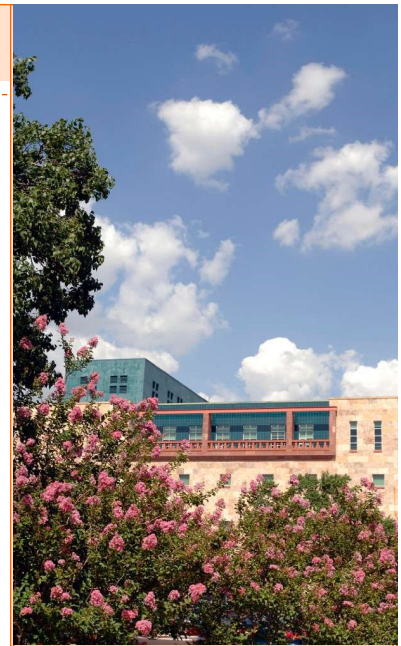
Although our spring semester has been filled with lots of busy work activities, it has also been sprinkled with celebration and recognition. There were many advising center open-houses; advisors presenting at professional conferences; advisors being elected to leadership positions; advisors being recognized by students for their commitment to student success; and several advisors celebrating their 5, 10, 15, 20 and 25 year milestones.

As we prepare and look forward to this upcoming summer semester know that your hard work has had a significant impact on the enrollment for the summer. Your participation with the Summer School kick-off parties; Spring 2016 UTSA Day event; and the "Early Bird" registration initiative as well as your encouraging current students to consider summer classes at UTSA and advising them to take online UTSA courses as they go home for the summer has been instrumental in the university summer school initiative. The results of your commitment along with the other university initiatives have resulted in a 11.62% change in semester credit hour (SCH) comparison of Summer 2016 vs. Summer 2015 enrollment. The university's goal for summer enrollment is 10,000 students and 70,000 SCH. As of April 25, 2016 we were at 10,860 students and 66,833 SCH. You all did an amazing job!

As you gear up for the fall 2016 new freshman and transfer students, I encourage you to make every interaction count as you help the students map out their path to success. Continue to grow and develop your technology skills as we diligently move forward into testing and implementation phase of SSC campus. This will to ensure the transition over to SSC Campus is smooth.

I end this message by encouraging you to reflect back on all that you have accomplished and the difference you have made, as well as reflecting on the successes you have seen with your students. You should especially be encouraged by those walking the stage later this week. Take time to consider and reflect on your accomplishments, milestones and your student successes. I strongly encourage you to consider taking some time off to relax with family and friends, even if only for a day. I am so thankful to have the opportunity to work with such an amazing team!

UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA– RESILIENCE TRAINING

Dainon Deviney (USSTS), Brandy Barksdale (STPL), Miranda Swain and Jackie Loden (AHUM) attended an eight day training in January at the UT Rio Grande Valley campus led by Karen Reivich, Director of Training Programs at the University of Pennsylvania’s Positive Psychology Center. This training is a UT-System initiative.

The goal is for this training to equip the advising community with the tools to effectively use resilience principles and techniques when working with students, so that they may further support and contribute to their academic success.

MAJOR PROJECTS MEAN A BUSY SUMMER

DWX PLANNER PROJECT

The Provost’s Office would like 100% of enrolled students to have a locked and active semester-by-semester plan—to graduation for sophomores through seniors and three semesters out for continuing freshmen (two semesters out for new/incoming freshmen).

There are currently 13,960 students who will need a plan by the August 15 deadline. This number is significantly reduced from the original 23,000 active students before removing those not enrolled in spring and those who applied for graduation. Advisors will create plans in the following order: JR, SO, FR, SR.

The hope is that this project will result in more students knowing what courses to register for in upcoming semesters and help the Registrar and departments in planning what courses to offer each semester.

EARLY BIRD PROGRAM

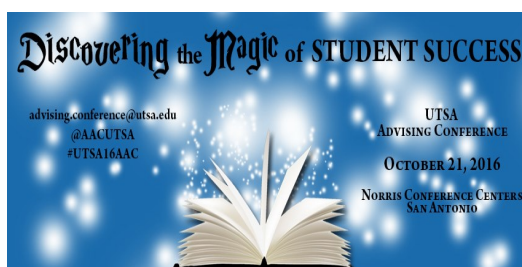
As part of the push to increase student enrollment in the summer, UTSA has introduced the “Early Bird” Program, targeting incoming freshmen admitted for the fall 2016. The program invites them to enroll in 1-2 courses in an 8-week session, starting June 13.

UTSA ADVISING CONFERENCE

A dedicated group of advisors, led by Brandy Barksdale (STPL), John Bonner (STPL), and Laura Garcia (IDED), and supported by Dainon Deviney (USSTS), continue to plan for the 9th Annual UTSA Advising Conference to be held October 21, 2016.

The theme this year is “Discovering the Magic of Student Success” and encourages academic advisors to discover ways to ensure the success of our students’ academic journey and beyond.

As the evolution of the scholar continues to affect and mold the way we advise, advisors will need to find alternative ways to connect and collaborate in order to strengthen their identity within the academic mission. 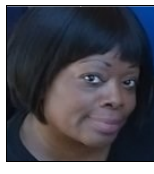

Jay has been with IDED Advising for a little over a year and primarily advises Multidisciplinary Studies majors.



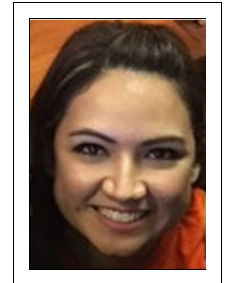

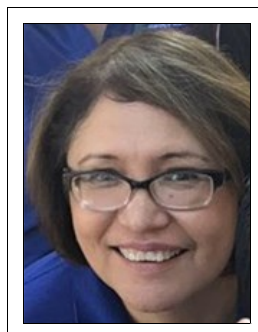

STUDENT AFFAIRS CONFERENCE

Academic advisors from various centers attended the UTSA Student Affairs Conference on March 4, 2016. The conference presentations focused on developing student workers, sharing best practices, and increasing health and wellness for academic professionals. Courtney Clark, the dynamic and engaging keynote speaker, started the day by discussing techniques for overcoming challenges, which she refers to as “detours.”

Session topics included theory-based practices in higher education, active listening & communication, wellness, and many others. The sessions encouraged higher education professionals to start from within in order to put our best selves forward. Advisors in attendance agreed that many of the learning outcomes discussed are shared by the academic advising community.
